Central East District's Fall meeting was held in quaint Winder, GA in the Winder Woman's Club Clubhouse, hosted by GFWC Athens-Oconee Junior Woman's Club, Lawrenceville Woman's Club, Monroe Junior Woman's Club, and Winder Woman's Club. We met on September 30, 2023, on GFWC's Day of Service and Central East District leaned into the meaning of the day. The Central East clubs brought nonperishable food that the Winder Club delivered to The Food Pantry in Winder, GA.

Menia Chester, from the Augusta Women's Club, gave a talk on food insecurity. We learned about food deserts and food swamps (a food swamp is an area that has more access to less nutritious foods than nutrient-dense foods.)

Here is some more information about Food Deserts.

#### Food Deserts Menia Chester, Augusta Woman's Club

Food deserts are more prevalent than you might know. Just what is a food desert? According to the United States Department of Agriculture, it is a low-income census tract with at least 500 people, or 33% of the population, living more than one mile (urban areas) or 10 miles (rural areas from a large grocery store.

The food desert locator is a tool that was created to help people learn what areas in their communities are considered to be food deserts. What can you do to help raise awareness about food deserts?

- Learn about Food Deserts and Food Swamps in your area.
- Raise awareness about food deserts and food swamps.
- Inform your city and county leadership by discussing what you know.
- Find out if your county leadership is aware of the problem and if there are plans to combat food insecurity in your county.
- Talk with the members of your community about the importance of eating fresh fruit and vegetables.
- When people don't have access to fresh fruit and vegetables, they have higher instances of chronic diseases such as diabetes, heart disease, and stroke.
- We can help prevent hospital visits for these diseases by ensuring that everyone around us has easy access to fresh fruit and vegetables.

Program	Club	Project
GFWC Juniors' Special Program: Advocates for Children	GFWC Vienna Woman's Club	The Washcloth Teddy Bears project ties creative challenges to random door prizes at their monthly meetings. At a meeting, a set of twelve washcloths was the "prize," and the challenge was to create a hands-on project for their next club meeting. As Foster Care Month is in May, the research resulted in ways to creatively use washcloths to help foster children. Each member brought twelve washcloths and learned to craft them into cloth teddy bears. The finished teddy bears were delivered to the Department of Family and Children's Services office for distribution to foster children.
Environment Community Service Program	GFWC Georgia Augusta Woman's Club	Boat/Native Plant Project - GFWC Georgia Augusta Woman's Club assisted in turning an abandoned, dilapidated fiberglass boat into a centerpiece for a native plant garden by partner- ing with a Scout. Members met and assisted with paperwork, trained on gardening and native plants, growing plants from seeds, and anchoring the boat using natural products. The club provid- ed seed starter sets and mulch for the boat, walk- ing path, and bench.
Health and Wellness Community Service Program	GFWC Service Guild of Covington	Corn Hole Camaraderie - GFWC Service Guild of Covington project facilitated exercising with senior citizens. The club members visited an assisted living/memory care nine times yearly to play Corn Hole with the residents. The club offers refreshments. This was a rewarding project for the residents and the club members.
Communications and Public Relations Advancement Program	GFWC Lilburn Woman's Club	Scavenger Hunt Anniversary Celebration - To celebrate the GFWC Lilburn Woman's Club's 50th anniversary, a virtual scavenger hunt was developed using the online app, Eventzee. The hunt's challenges are related to projects the club has spearheaded over the years. Founding members and partner organizations created videos. Participants used the app to complete the hunt, which required them to watch videos and visit local sites. Donated prizes were given to those who completed the hunt.

#### 2022-2024 GFWC Georgia Jennie Award Recipient — Peggy Wilson

The GFWC Jennie Award honors one clubwoman from each GFWC Region for outstanding commitment to club, community, and family. They are chosen by their clubs to compete at state, regional, and national levels for their outstanding personal commitment to club, community, and family.

The GFWC Jennie Award is named in honor of GFWC's founder, Jane Cunningham Croly, who wrote for national newspapers under the pseudonym "Jennie June." The award highlights those extraordinary clubwomen who epitomize her spirit of independence, courage, and persistence in purpose through their roles as volunteers within their clubs, elsewhere in the community, and as members of a family or extended family. Although GFWC has many awards for states and clubs, the GFWC Jennie Award is the only national honor that recognizes individual members for personal excellence. In fact, it is the highest honor bestowed by GFWC.

The 2023 GFWC Georgia Jennie Award Recipient is **Peggy Wilson** of GFWC Morrow Civic Woman's Club.

For 32 years, Peggy Wilson has been involved in the GFWC Federation in Georgia. Peggy is a member of the GFWC GA Morrow Civic Woman's Club (MCWC), where she has served in nearly every leadership role, including Club President. She has worked in all Community Service Project (CSP) areas and has been instrumental in securing funds as the Budget and Finance Chair. For 19 years, Peggy chaired the primary MCWC fundraiser, an annual fashion show. At present, she continues leading fundraising efforts through Bunco Nights and various opportunities. Peggy has received club honors such as Club Woman of the Year and Club Family of the Year.

At the district level, Peggy chaired CSPs and held all offices, including the District President, for two terms. At the State level, Peggy has chaired several positions, including Convention Chair, LEADS presenter, and offices of Recording Secretary, Third Vice President, and currently Second Vice President.

Peggy is dedicated to her family. She and Thomas Wilson were married in 1963, and they welcomed their son, Neal, into the family in 1967. Peggy has two grandchildren, Nathan,



born in 2003, and Ashley, born in 2005. Over the years, Peggy's family has enjoyed the simple pleasures of life – traveling, special milestones, time at the lake, and her grandchildren's extracurricular activities.

Peggy's commitment extends to her community. She served as a teacher for 37 years and received accolades such as Adamson Middle School Teacher of the Year, Georgia Middle School Team of the Year, and Runner-Up for Georgia English Teacher of the Year. She was inducted into the TBS Teacher Hall of Fame. Peggy draws from her teaching and leadership skills as the First Baptist Church of Morrow Sunday School Superintendent, where she served as a Sunday School teacher for adults and children. She is President of the Senior Adult Merry Hearts and is a Senior Adult Choir member who performs at local geriatric facilities. Peggy served as Secretary of the Clayton General Hospital Board and has volunteered with the Morrow City Fire Department on their Halloween Trick or Treat Nights. John Lampl, Mayor of the City of Morrow, describes Peggy as a passionate, talented, and well-rounded leader he is proud to represent. Peggy has served on her neighborhood HOA Board and organized activities for her community's families.

The limitation of space restricts the sharing of all of Peggy's achievements. Yet, her bio exemplifies the true spirit of the GFWC Jennie Award. Her GFWC sisters extend congratulations to Peggy Wilson on her exemplary Federated journey.

**FACT:** American women are killed by intimate partners more often than by any other type of perpetrator, and this type of homicide accounts for approximately 40% to 50% of U.S. femicides.

**FACT:** 19% of domestic violence incidents involve a weapon, and the presence of a gun in that situation increases the risk of homicide by 500 percent.



- **December** don't forget the moms and the kids in shelters. Help sponsor a Christmas party with Santa, a game for each family, or a book for each kid. Celebrate the workers at the shelter with a continental breakfast or Starbucks gift cards. This is the season for giving.
- January 11 National Human Trafficking Day. Wear Teal on that day with your name tag upside down. When someone tells you your tag is upside down, you can explain why and why you are wearing teal.
- SAVE THE DATE: The Georgia Coalition Against Domestic Violence (GCADV) is the leading voice to end domestic violence in Georgia, representing over 50 state domestic violence organizations and programs. They are sponsoring Stand with Survivors Day at the Capitol on February 1, 2024. There is usually an Advocacy 101 Webinar the day before that gives you all the details. Save the Date and make plans to attend. Check out the website to register for the Georgia Coalition Against Domestic Violence event.
- February is Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month. In Georgia, individuals in dating relationships are excluded from accessing temporary protective orders under the Family Violence Act unless the individuals share a child, currently live in the same household, or have formerly lived in the same household. If stalking is involved, teens may be able to seek relief under Georgia's stalking statute. Teen victims would need to be able to show evidence of a pattern of stalking or harassment.
