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## **Federal Funding for Libraries**

Libraries serve a significant role in communities across the nation. Every day, libraries provide no fee access to computers and the internet, jumpstart small businesses, help people find jobs, support literacy development for children, and help veterans transition to civilian life. Libraries have also been instrumental in providing support for community members in need during the COVID-19 pandemic by offering free Wi-Fi access in their facilities' parking lots, loaning internet hotspot equipment and connected devices to patrons, assisting with unemployment benefit applications, and even supplying access to COVID-19 tests and vaccines.

The Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) is the only source of dedicated federal funding for the more than 117,000 public, school, academic, government, and special libraries across the nation. LSTA Grants to States ensure that every state has access to needed resources and authority to determine their use. LSTA funds support a wide range of essential services, including:

- Preparing students for the job market with coding and STEM programs;
- Accelerating business development with services provided by skilled business and technology outreach librarians;
- Supporting people with print disabilities by providing accessible digital and print content;
- Narrowing the digital divide with Wi-Fi and hotspot lending; and
- Providing equitable access to technology for all

Funding of at least \$232 million for LSTA and \$50 million for IAL allows more than 117,000 public, school, academic, government, and other libraries to advance employment, entrepreneurship, education, empowerment, and engagement in communities across America. School libraries and librarians provide targeted literacy skills development and resources for all students, including those in the most high-need areas. The Innovative Approaches to Literacy (IAL) grants are administered by the Department of Education and provide age-appropriate books, parental engagement programs, and professional development for library experts to ensure children are best positioned for success. Greater literacy support at an early age is strongly linked to increased reading scores and progress for students. Funding of at least \$232 million for LSTA and \$50 million for IAL is a modest, but critical, investment in your libraries and the opportunities they provide your constituents. We must urge Congress to continue to make full funding for our nation's libraries a priority for 2024.

#### "Storybook Trail"

The **GFWC/Iowa Grangers Women's Club** partnered with the Granger Public Library to display a series of published children's picture books at a local park. The Storybook Trail focused on families with small children to enjoy nature and be entertained by reading books along the walk. The walk was 835 feet long and each page of the story was separated by 32 feet. Pictures from the children's book were installed along the path with the help of club members. As families stopped along the path, they were directed to the next page in the story. Pages frequently were accompanied by activities. Twenty-five stations were installed in the park.

## GFWC Thompson Falls Woman's Club, Montana 100 Books B4 Graduation

To stimulate a love for reading, a challenge is being offered to 9th to 12th grade students in Sanders County from Thompson Falls west to include both Thompson Falls and Noxon High Schools plus homeschooled students to read 100 Books Before Graduation.

Students enroll with a parent/guardian's approval in person or via email through the Thompson Falls Public Library, where a reading log will be kept for each student. Books must be reading level appropriate and may be a classroom assignment, but not the class textbook. Using the provided form, students may report a completed book in person or via email stating the title, author, format, and signature of a parent, guardian, teacher, or school counselor. Print, Ebooks, audiobooks, or another format are all acceptable.

Every book read will earn one entry into a quarterly drawing. There will be one top prize winner for a \$25 gift card and one \$10 gift card winner each quarter from all the entries. The winner will be offered a choice between two or three gift cards for local businesses such as gas or food. Drawings will take place at the Woman's Club meeting in January, April, July (at TFPL), and September.

"Reading is an important part of future success and a source of much pleasure throughout life. The GFWC Thompson Falls Woman's Club is delighted to join with the Thompson Falls Public Library to bring this program to our community. We realize Juniors and Seniors will find it difficult to complete 100 books before graduation, but they are most welcome to try for the quarterly drawings," stated Woman's Club President, Cathy Mills.

All students reporting having read 100 books before graduation will receive a \$100 gift card.
