HOW TO GET STARTED WITH GFWC GEORGIA REPORTING

- Submit a report online via gfwcga.org by the deadline of January 25th at 11:59 p.m. each year.
- The Reporting Section is under Club Resources > Reporting & Forms. Password: smile
- Access the CSP/Advance Area/Special Project online Questionnaires (Reports).
- Complete All Sections of the respective Report.
- Submit.
- Reporters will receive an email copy of responses.
- If errors are discovered after submission, file an edited version.
- Input all personal information such as personal email, name, and club office held.
- Pull down menu for club and district.
- Insert information of reporter.
- Pull down the menu for the type of club, input the number of members for which your club paid dues.



COMPUTE STATISTICAL INFORMATION BEFORE YOU BEGIN WRITING REPORT

- Use the Worksheet to gather the information for accuracy.
- Total number of volunteer hours your members worked on all projects in this area.
- Total amount in dollars donated by the club for all projects in this area.
- Total value of in-kind donations for all projects in this area.

CHECK OUR YEARBOOK FOR AFFILIATES

- Complete Number of projects completed for the Affiliate.

SUGGESTION FOR WRITING REPORTS:

- Start collecting information early. Be the early bird.
- Collect all data about the project before writing up the project.
- Write up your project in a Word or Mac document.
- Ensure you have not exceeded the 1,000-character minimum for each project.
- When it comes time to fill in information for online reporting, copy and paste your narrative.
- This will help relieve some of the stress of reporting.
- More information on reporting can be found on the <u>GFWC Georgia Website</u> This is an excellent source of information!
- Make sure you include the group or groups with which you collaborated.



From Lisa Ramsey, South West District President:

Be sure to collect all pertinent information at the meeting immediately following the project (donations, how many members participated, amount of funds raised, in-kind donations, etc.). Therefore, it will be recorded in the minutes. You should have access to a digital copy of the minutes, and then you can copy and paste what you need. This is much easier than trying to recall the details months later.

Increase in Membership

Congratulations to everyone for adding birds to your birdhouses! From the clubs who worked hard and retained members to the clubs who brought in new members- **thank you!** I am happy to share that for the club year 2023, we increased our overall membership by **101 members.** The days of a decrease in membership are behind us----we are increasing our membership and growing.

We now have 1509 members.

The breakdown is 1371 Woman's, 112 Juniors and 26 Juniorette members.

We have 63 clubs: 52 Woman's, 9 Juniors and 2 Juniorettes.

Special shout-outs to the North West District for increasing membership by 71 new members, the South West District by 23 new members, and the South East District for forming a new club.


We printed 10,000 and only have a few hundred left---but if you need some- please let me know, and I will get them mailed to you.

The Membership Funnel: The Full Picture of Getting New Members

Before you start recruiting, ask yourself: What does the recruitment journey for new members look like now, and what should it look like going forward?

Providing a smooth and personalized member experience is one of the most important tools at your disposal—even at the recruitment stage. Ensure prospective new members are incentivized to make it through the sign-up process.

That's where the membership funnel comes in.



Membership

Here's a breakdown of how the membership funnel creates new members for your club:

Step 1: Capture. Prospective members are "captured" when looped into your club's workings, whether by email newsletter, attending an event, or word of mouth.



Step 2: Nurture. Send follow-up emails, mailers, or phone calls nudging prospective new members to sign up. Make prospective members feel appreciated and valued with personalized attention, especially if they've shown you interest!

Step 3: Conversion. Offer incentives to signing up, like membership benefits. You might also emphasize key aspects of the membership experience, like community impact.

Now that you know the main steps involved in recruitment, here are some ideas for attracting new members to your club.

Involve Current Members

- Host a "bring a friend" meeting. Encourage members to bring someone to see how your club is run.
- Offer an alternate meeting time to attract people with different schedules. Is your meeting time leaving out a whole group of people, like those with 9-5 jobs or early bedtimes? Switch up your offerings to attract more women—existing and new members!
- Run member features in your newsletter. If your members are featured in the newsletter, they might feel more compelled to send it to friends and colleagues to show off their involvement.
- Encourage members to share your newsletter, especially if they're featured in it!
- Thank your members regularly. There are a few different ways you can do that. Here are just a few:
- Create a video thank-you message from the club president, and publish it on your website, social media profiles, and email newsletter.
- Each year, list all the events, services, and educational opportunities made possible by your membership fees.
 Publish the list on a separate page on your site, and link to it on a regular basis in your online content and email campaigns.
- Host a yearly event to say "thank you" to your members.
 Consider a member brunch, picnic, pool party, or other fun gathering.
- Write handwritten thank-you notes to your members. A
 personalized note is even more meaningful and memorable in our digital age.

- Create perks for club members who recruit new members. Little perks and freebies can really motivate people.
 Think about gift certificates and shout-outs at your next meeting or newsletter.
- Help members develop an "elevator pitch" about their membership. Why are they members? What's the most significant benefit of membership? Can they explain the purpose of your club? Why does being a member of the Federation matter?
- Host an event or distribute resources for how members can talk to others about your club. Remind current members to greet newcomers and avoid club jargon—making your club approachable is vital.
- Create an invitation email template your members can use. This is another excellent idea for distributing a grassroots membership recruitment tool to your members!
- You could also create paper-based pamphlets or member application forms. Another idea is a simple boilerplate text script that current members can copy and paste into emails or social media messages they send to colleagues.
- Or you could include the new member onboarding or welcome package that new members receive!
- Offer club business cards to your members. It's easy for them to point people to your club and share more easily with their network.
- Get existing members together to volunteer as a group. You'll do well in your community, strengthen bonds between existing members, and meet other volunteers in your club.
- Ask members to list their membership in their professional bios. It gets your club's name in front of more people, builds your organization's prestige, and reminds members to talk about it.
- Film member stories and testimonials. Publish them on your website and social media so you can give prospective members a visual reminder of just how engaged your current members are.
- Personally follow up with every prospect. When someone signs up for an event, email them directly and ask if they'd like to sign up for club membership. You know they're already interested in what you do—reach out!
- Launch a direct mail campaign. You might see success If you can acquire a mailing list or mail to lapsed members.
- Launch a telephone outreach campaign.
- Reach out to former members. People leave clubs for all kinds of reasons, from life events to time constraints.

Membership

- Some might be ready to come back. Remind them of your mission and how valuable their membership is!
- Conduct exit interviews with departing members. When you know why people are leaving, you can start figuring out ways to keep them.

Recruit Members Through Your Website

- Make sure your club website is welcoming, easy to browse, and representative. Your website should reflect your club's mission and have a clear site map.
- Add a "Join Us" section to your website. This is an easy
 way to draw immediate attention to anyone looking to join
 your membership. You can also include testimonials from
 current members and the perks of joining your club.
- Set up Google Analytics or link tracking using Goo.gl or Bit.ly. This will help you find out the most effective methods for getting new website traffic so you can double down on them.
- Make online registration as easy as possible. If you include online member application forms, anyone coming across your website will be much more likely to register than if they have to mail in a paper form.
- Refine your member benefits. Make them as clear and enticing as possible in your website copy so that prospective members can't help but be impressed.
- Create member-only sections on your website. Including a section on your website that normal visitors can't see can help generate interest — they'll come across it and wonder what more they're missing out on.

Event Recruitment Ideas

- Offer one event a year at your 'members-only' rate. If you usually have one rate for members and another for non-members, pick one signature event and offer it to anyone at the member's price. This is a great demonstration of the value they will get if they join which you should be sure to mention during said event!
- Invite guests to meetings. Let prospective members see what they're getting into by inviting them to your meetings.
- Create a welcome packet for guests. Include things like the mission, calendar, contact information, and information about becoming a member.
- Follow up with guests. Send an email or postcard or make a phone call thanking the guest for attending and asking if they're considering membership. Sending out a post-event survey can also help you see what went well and what you can improve for next time.
- Sponsor a local event. Include your club's name and logo

- on promotional materials, and make sure event organizers have your club information for anyone who asks.
- Give a talk about your club at other organizations. Share your mission and activities with others in your arena.
- Host activities for members and non-members alike. A
 group activity is an excellent way to meet new people.
 Something like a beach clean-up or other community service projects can attract a wide range of prospective members.
- Walk or build a float for town parades. You'll put your club in front of the whole town and look good doing it!
- Host seasonal meet-and-greets with a fun activity. Think about a fall hayride, a winter hot cocoa party, a spring nature walk, or a summer ice cream social to attract new members.
- Have a booth at a fair or festival. Give volunteers talking points to introduce your club to the community.
- Have a meeting in a public location like a park or square. It draws attention and is a low-commitment way for curious potential members to check you out.
- Host a guest speaker. Guest speakers attract non-members
 who share your interests. Not only are speakers powerful
 motivators for attendance at meetings and events, but they
 can also encourage ideas and discussions that might convince a new member to stick around and hear more from
 existing members.
- Host a charitable event like a run or walk. You'll raise money for a good cause and introduce your club to new people who also support the cause.
- Host a business spotlight event for local businesses. Local business owners will learn about each other, and about you!
- Hold diverse events to appeal to a variety of age groups. If all your events appeal to one group of people, mix things up by hosting an event to appeal to a different one. Try a teen-targeted event or one aimed toward seniors!
- Host a complimentary luncheon. Never underestimate the power of free food to bring people to an event!
- Consider attendance options. Are your attendance requirements onerous? Experiment to see if a more flexible policy is more attractive. Hybrid and virtual attendance options are rising, and you see why—flexibility can be part of a great member experience!
- Host low-commitment meet-and-greets at a local coffee shop. Invite prospective members to coffee with you to learn about your club and meet some existing members.



GFWC National Day of Service

The inaugural General Federation of Women's Clubs (GFWC) National Day of Service (NDS) proved impactful in raising food resources for communities across the country. This year's campaign spotlighted the food insecurity and hunger crisis. The results received from the "NDS Impact Report" sent to participating clubs indicate GFWC clubwomen collected 290,982 pounds of nonperishable food, recorded more than 40,000 volunteer hours, collected \$276,832 in monetary donations, and contributed to the preparation of more than 241,672 meals.

The GFWC NOS is an annual public awareness campaign for members to create Community Service Projects in their communities to help others. **The 2024 GFWC NDS is scheduled for Saturday, September 28**, and will spotlight **food insecurity**. 

Student Art Competition. Encourage your community high school seniors to participate in this competition. The contest is open to high school seniors. Four winning State entries will receive awards that can be up to \$500 each. When collecting art from your high school teachers, you will want to verify that contest rules are being followed.

The District application deadline is **January 25**. Entry forms are mailed or emailed to your District Arts and Culture Chairwoman, who should inform their district clubs of the procedures for your district contest. The four (4) top winners from each district will compete in the State competition. We guarantee that Clubs who participate will be rewarded by seeing the amazing creations of your talented young people.



Advocacy 101 (Webinar) — February 6, 2024

During this 2-hour webinar, you will learn more about our advocacy priorities, receive tips on how to talk to legislators, and be able to ask questions.



Kick-Off (In-Person) — February 7, 2024

During this event, you will learn how our key legislative priorities impact survivors and their families.

Please plan to attend both events, and on February 7th, please wear purple and your name tag. Visit the Georgia Coalition Against Domestic Violence (GCADV) **Stand With Survivors Day** page to register for the event.

- January 11 National Human Trafficking Day. Wear Teal on that day with your name tag upside down. When someone tells you your tag is upside down, you can explain why you are wearing teal.
- January is National Self-Defense Month. During this month, schedule a self-defense class for your club or educate your members about self-defense options that could save their lives. To protect yourself, be aware of your surroundings, make eye contact, and put down your phone.
- January is National Stalking Awareness Month. Stalkers employ multiple tactics to instill fear, intimidate, surveil, and exert control over the people they target. Studies show that 1 in 6 women and 1 in 17 men have been subjected to stalking in their lifetime, the majority of whom were threatened by someone they know—often a current or former intimate partner. Survivors often suffer physical, psychological, and social harm, such as higher-than-average rates of depression, anxiety, and insomnia.
- February is Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month.
 - * When we teach teens about healthy, nonviolent relationships, we support their development and create safer, healthier communities for everyone.
 - * By recognizing the signs of dating and domestic violence and making clear that abuses of power are never acceptable, we can build a culture where respect is the norm, dignity is the rule, and safety is the expectation—both online and offline.
 - * In Georgia, individuals in dating relationships are excluded from accessing temporary protective orders under the Family Violence Act unless the individuals share a child, currently live in the same household, or have formerly lived in the same household. If stalking is involved, teens may be able to seek relief under Georgia's stalking statute. Teen victims would need to be able to show evidence of a pattern of stalking or harassment.



The GFWC Leadership, Education, and Development Seminar (LEADS) identifies GFWC members at the local level who have the potential and desire to as-

sume leadership positions in their State Federations and/or GFWC on the national level. Participation in GFWC LEADS can help up-and-coming leaders gain the capabilities, confidence, and commitment necessary to pursue and achieve higher offices and serve with distinction.

GFWC LEADS is held annually on the day prior to the official opening of the GFWC Annual Convention. One attendee from each State Federation and International Affiliate Club is eligible to participate in the annual GFWC LEADS program. In addition, GFWC demonstrates its commitment to training leaders by funding a portion of the expenses of candidates who are members of per capita dues paying clubs. State Federations may also offer to fund a portion of expenses. LEADS candidates are asked to be responsible for a portion of expenses as an affirmation of their personal commitment to their leadership development and training.



The current national estimated value of each volunteer hour is \$31.80.


The value of each volunteer hour in Georgia is \$29.67.

Now is when GFWC Georgia members will follow and act on Bills pertinent to GFWC Resolutions. It is critical to remember that when we advocate on behalf of the Federation, we must adhere to the following:

- When speaking on behalf of the Federation, members may not oppose the GFWC resolutions.
- GFWC is a nonpartisan, nondenominational organization. Clubwomen can advocate for policies or legislation but are NOT allowed by law to endorse candidates or engage in partisan politics. GFWC members must separate personal political activities from an official club or state federation work.
- Minority opinions may be expressed as follows: A member organization (club or state federation) holding a minority opinion and wishing to support its stand further may do so provided it states that its action represents the minority vote of GFWC.







Member Spotlight

As this issue coincides with "Reporting Month," it is fitting that we "shine the light" on two clubwomen who have been very instrumental in transforming our whole reporting process from a paper and pen one, with mailing reams of paper to the State Committee Chairmen, to one that is completely electronic using online questionnaires. These two ladies are the mother-daughter team of Deborah Landress, our Administrative Assistant and Laedenia Jewell, our 2022-2024 State Communications and Public Relations Chairman.

Using their technical skills and knowledge of Google features, they created the Google Online Questionnaires for the old paper versions of CSP/Advancement Area/Special Projects/Achievement Goal Sheet reports. Clubwomen began using these questionnaires in January 2021 for their reports for 2020. The information from the individual questionnaires was transferred to spreadsheets that in turn were converted into a readable format and sent to the respective chairmen for judging. Each year updates have been made to the questionnaires to conform to changes in GFWC, GFWC Georgia programs and practices, and suggestions by Georgia clubwomen. One notable change over the years is the increase in number of characters for the narrative portion of the questionnaires, giving clubs more "space" to adequately detail their projects.

Because of their innovative efforts, reporting is easier, more efficient, and more cost effective. Less time is spent by clubwomen in entering information on paper forms, copying, and mailing to the respective chairmen, thus saving everyone time and money. Because of their dedication, expertise, and patience, the reporting process for GFWC Georgia has been transformed and brought into the digital age.

You are "Women Who Make a Difference!"



Deborah was born at St. Joseph's Hospital in Atlanta, GA, the oldest of three with two brothers. She lived in Decatur and Norcross until she was 12, when her family moved to Los Angeles, CA because her stepfather, a CB, was transferred to Point Mugu. It was

there she found her love of crafting and ceramics.

The family was transferred several more times during her adolescence — Brunswick, GA, where she spent many days on Jekyll Island to Gulfport, MS, where she spent her days attending school, playing softball, and graduating high school in 1978 in the little town of Sacier, MS.

After high school, she attended Jeff Davis Junior College for two years with the dream of becoming a nurse, however, life and love intervened, and she married her high school sweetheart and had a child.

As a result, her career path changed, and she was introduced to the world of computers when the copier repair shop she was working at began selling computers — a Xerox with an 8" floppy disk drive and a legal size monitor. She soon was elevated from office work to training office staff on equipment they sold. From that early introduction to computers, she advanced in her next job to selling IBM and Apple computers and training users on the Microsoft office systems, working herself up the ranks to manager.

She moved back to Norcross, GA, where she worked at a factoring company, creating database programs for them. After relocating again, she continued her work with writing programs and creating specialty reports for the payroll department of Randstad Temp Force. In 1996 during the Olympics, she had the distinct

privilege of touching every paycheck over 10K each week for the event.

After the Olympics, she volunteered in her kids' school and with the Chamber of Commerce mentoring at schools. And she decided to further her own education by finishing her degree, as her daughter was also attending college.

Then her life took another turn as she found and married the love of her life, Chuck. It was through her mother-in-law, Pat, that she was introduced to GFWC in 2004. She continued to volunteer with the Chamber and serve on the Youth Leadership Committee, and attend college, while learning about club work in the Winder community. She embraced club work and volunteered her way through the ranks of her club and district. Always hungry for more information about the organization, she researched and learned about GFWC while attending Conventions, Institute, and making lifelong friendships with fellow clubwomen. And she is still passionate about clubwomen and history, while embracing the changes and legacy of the organization.

In 2016-2018, she served as the first Central East District President after restructuring of the old numerical districts. In December 2018, she began work as the Administrative Assistant for the GFWC Georgia, a position she holds today. She is the glue that keeps the Georgia Federation going, working three days a week at the State Headquarters at the Lipscomb Cottage. She also monitors and posts to the Georgia social media sites, keeping clubwomen abreast of what is happening within the state and sharing tidbits from across the International Federa-

She is a member of the GFWC Athens-Oconee Junior Woman's Club and the GFWC Winder Woman's Club. In her spare time, she enjoys quilting.

Since its inception in 1790, the Coast Guard has answered the nation's call to duty, saving lives, enforcing maritime laws, combating terrorism, facilitating commerce, and protecting the environment. Throughout our history, highly trained men and women have carried out these responsibilities with honor, respect, and devotion.

Docked along side the 80,000 square foot structure will be the USCGC Eagle, America's Tall Ship and a training vessel for future Coast Guard officers.

Each year the **GFWC Tifton Junior Woman's Club** honors a special group on Veterans Day by making and sending a wreath to the World War II Memorial Monument in Washington, DC, to be placed in front of the Georgia State column. With the help of the Congressional staff of Representative Austin Scott, especially Zach Roberts, the Deputy Chief of Staff, this year's wreath was placed at the memo-

rial in recognition of the contributions of a deserving group of women.

This year's honorees were the 6888th Postal Directory Battalion, nicknamed the "Six Triple Eight." Stationed at Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia, this predominantly Black female Unit trained for a "secret" overseas mission. After arriving in Birmingham, England, these ladies learned of their orders. They were to clear several years of backlogged mail in the European Theater of Operations. Not only were the "Six Triple Eight" working in deplorable conditions such as cold, dirty, rat-infested aircraft hangers, they faced both racial and gender discrimination from their own military as well as the Red Cross.

Overcoming the discrimination and poor working conditions, these remarkable women processed approximately 65,000 pieces of mail per 8-hour shift. They worked 3 shifts per day. Scheduled to take 6 months in Birmingham, the "Six Triple Eight" completed the backlog in only 3 months! They continued to other deployments in France achieving such amazing success. They lived up to their motto— "No Mail, Low Morale."

On March 14, 2022, the 6888th Battalion was awarded the Congressional Gold Medal.



The **GFWC Dallas Woman's Club** had a Holiday Party with a Purpose on December 7, 2023. The members contributed over 75 toys for HOPE for Christmas, a program to provide toys and food for needy families in the greater Northwest Atlanta area, and at least 65 blankets and food items for the Paulding Animal Shelter. 




